

Dear Parents and Carers

I hope you had a good **Easter break**. It has been great to hear from the children about being able to get out and about a bit more and how much they have enjoyed outdoor socialising with friends and family.

I am also pleased to report that Year 2 and Year 3 have started their **swimming lessons**. Typically, our children go once a week in Year 3. In recent years we have used the Sport Premium funding to also pay for an intensive course of



swimming lessons in Year 2 where the children go three times a week in the summer term. This builds water confidence and enjoyment in advance of the Y3 lessons that can then focus on stroke improvement, etc. Unfortunately, current Year 3 have missed out on that strong introduction to school swimming, but I am pleased to say they did very well on Tuesday. (We will be keeping a close eye on their progress to see if any or all need to continue swimming into Y4, if that is possible.) Year 2 have also made a very good start and are excited by their outings. If you have a child or children in these year groups, please continue to liaise with class staff about the most practical clothing choices for swimming days and continue to practise fast changing at home!





The Department for Education has commissioned the **NSPCC** to launch a new helpline called Report Abuse in Education. The newly launched helpline will provide support to:

- children and young people who want to share current and non-recent experiences of sexual abuse and harassment
- children and young people who want to talk about being involved in or witnessing any incidents
- anyone who works or volunteers in a school setting and needs support and guidance
- adults who have experienced non-recent abuse
- parents and carers who are concerned about their own child or other children.

The Headingley and Kirkstall Combined School Band is also going to resume practising at Kirkstall Valley Primary School soon (let me know if your child might be interested in joining). Year 4 are eagerly preparing for their residential trip to Lineham Farm, which we hope will be going ahead.

Thank you for your cooperation in making telephone **parents' evening appointments** work. Some parents have actually found it easier to schedule phone calls around work commitments than traditional parents' evenings in school. Many parents with more than one child have also found it easier to manage than getting from slot to slot in school, often with the children in tow. More parents used speakerphone this time to allow conversations with two parents at the same time. We do miss showing you the children's work in books and on the walls though! When schools fully reopened on March 8th it felt very exciting and good to be back. We do have to acknowledge, though, that things are still not as they normally would be. We particularly feel for Reception parents who may not have had the opportunity to look round school and come in to see the classroom. We miss running Stay and Play in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 where there are informal opportunities to talk to class staff and look at children's work. We are proud of the way classes have worked to put their assemblies and productions online, but miss the applause and proud faces that the children experience when they perform live. Our soft starts in the morning have enabled us to avoid complicated queuing systems, but do mean that it can be harder to talk to teachers if they are inside with the children who have already arrived. I know you understand why these things are in place for now, but please do remember that we are still accessible via Tapestry, class emails and via the school office if you do not see teachers in person. (As well as next week's appointments.)


