# Essential Weekly Homework

## 1. Reading

Children in KS1 and some children in lower KS2 have a <u>school reading</u> <u>book</u>. They start by reading to

- Who is this writing intended for?

- · Did anything puzzle you?

#### Fiction and plays

- Who is the narrator?
- Who is the most important character?
- What do we know about the setting?
- Why does the writer use dialogue?

#### Poetry

- What do you see in your mind when you read this?
- What is the effect of the rhyme, rhythm and line length?

#### Non-fiction

- How can we locate information quickly in this text?
- · Why does the author use diagrams?

their grown-ups who will write a comment in the reading journal. As children get more confident it may be that instead they discuss the book with an adult who can ask them questions about what they have read. Our Reading Comprehension bookmark can help with thinking of

questions.

Children will also bring home a <u>school library book</u> that they have chosen to read for information or pleasure. This is on hold for the moment.

Children can also read their <u>own books</u> from home or the local library. To choose a book that is the right level of difficulty when children are still learning to read ask them to put down one finger for each word they can't work out on a page. 0 fingers is too easy, 5 is too hard. 3 is probably just about right.

## 2. Practising Maths Passport targets

Children will have maths passport targets to practise each week as they travel the continents of the world learning useful <u>maths facts</u> until they are confident enough to answer timed questions accurately on at least three different occasions. In Year 1 we are just introducing maths passport and our targets will begin with:


UK - say and count objects up to 10, say one more and one less than a given number up to 10

Europe – say and count objects up to 10, say one more and one less than a given number up to 20, know doubles to 5, know addition facts to 5

## 3. Learning sounds and spellings

Children will have spellings to practice this half term that will be checked in school and used in class work. These will be related to:

- phonics learning
- key words know off by
- tricky words to the rules

that are exceptions

In Year 1 you will find the spelling words we are practicing each week on our Friday phonics sheet which your child will bring home.

A good way to learn spellings is LOOK, SAY, COVER, WRITE and CHECK.

# **Optional Half Termly Homework**

If your child needs more ideas for things to do at home try these:

- 1. Maths activity Make your own number line to 10, 20 or beyond.
- 2. Writing activity Write a list for any celebration using your phonics to spell words eg a list of food for a wedding.

- 3. Create a picture of a celebration (and write labels/captions to show what is in the picture).
- 4. Reading/research activity Read and talk about different celebrations and make a list in your homework book.
- 5. Useful websites or online activities are: PhonicsPlay and BBC websites

Don't forget that telling a grown up about their learning and explaining new knowledge and skills is the very best homework a child can do!
