

Eligibility

There are some basic eligibility requirements needed to meet to become a qualified primary school teacher in England:

- Honours degree
- GCSE grade 4+ / C+ in English and Maths
- Science GCSE
- Disclosure & Barring Service (DBS) check

Graduates seeking a place on a PGCE course apply through UCAS:

- Training Provider Code 2HX
- Course Code 3-7 3DW4
- Course Code 5-11 3B2B

Our cluster particularly values applications from potential teachers with relevant work with children.

The PGCE with Leeds Beckett University results in the award of Post Graduate Certificate in Education (PGCE) with Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) and Masters credits.

This route is not salaried, but student finance is available and some of our graduates have been able to apply for bursaries, childcare fees and other assistance.

Each school has an experienced tutor/mentor as well as supportive classroom teachers.



How we support our trainees
